






Often associated with Leading Lines > Vanishing Point






Framing directs the viewer's eye

Creative, original


Looked into subject's eyes








What is JPEG?


A compressed file where image variables adjustments made in camera by settings and algorithms

Is a JPEG image ready to print or share?



Clean it up! aka Post-processing








If nothing else, straighten the horizon & crop

To add contrast, increase tonal range & vibrance, try the Auto Enhance tool
